Margot Boulet, from the GIGN to the 2024 Paralympic Games

Originally from Provins, Margot's thoughts were far from imagining a future in the Paralympics. A former toplevel swimmer, she joined the Gendarmerie in 2012 as part of the Republican Guard, with the goal of joining the GIGN (National Gendarmerie Intervention Group), But during her training, her life changed forever when she was involved in a serious parachuting accident. Spotted by the para-rowing federation, this young woman

decided to try her hand at this sport. Just a few months after her debut, she won her first bronze medal at the 2020 European

Championships, followed by an Olympic bronze medal at the Tokyo 2020 Paralympic Games. Since then, Margot has competed in every final and this year hopes to win gold at home with the French crew in the mixed coxed four.

Zagreb: arrival of Croatia Airlines' first A220-300

This year, the Croatian airline is celebrating its 35th anniversary as well as its first A220, named "Zagreb", with a capacity of 149 seats. This delivery is part of the replacement of its entire fleet with next-generation aircraft, which will ultimately include 15 new A220 aircraft, of which 13 A220-300s and two A220-100s.

The aircraft completed its first commercial flight between Zagreb and Split on 6 August. The A220 will enable the national airline to take a major technological step forward, resulting in greater efficiency thanks to a 25% reduction in fuel consumption and CO2 emissions per seat compared with previous-generation aircraft.

Delivery of the second aircraft is scheduled for the end of 2024, while the following six are expected in 2025, another four in 2026 and a further three in 2027.







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
